Rationale

Social distancing in a school setting will require smaller groups of students in one room or setting. Smaller groups require schools to reassess how these groups will not only be monitored, but who will provide instruction. Flexibility in licensure of existing staff is needed to utilize current staff, when necessary, to teach outside of their existing license (content or developmental age level). This flexibility should also extend to licensed paraprofessional staff to help deliver content specific instruction that had been developed by an educator licensed in that content area. Examples: at the elementary and middle school levels, it would be helpful to use specials teachers (i.e. Art, Music, Phy Ed) in general classroom settings. At the high school level flexibility to use teachers "off license" to facilitate learning and credit attainment (Special Education teachers granting credit in any licensure area; Ag teachers as the teacher of record in Biology) in state required subjects will, again, allow for maximum creativity in flexible problem solving. Additional consideration along these lines should be granted to teachers with a substitute only license.

Rationale

Substitute Teachers – Many substitutes in our districts are retired and in the high-risk category based on age.

Rationale

Bilingual Teachers – The President's Executive Order to expand restrictions on work visas will make it more difficult for schools to fill bilingual positions.

Hours of Instruction

Rationale

Direct pupil instruction took on new meaning once the Safer at Home Order went into effect in March of 2020. What was previously the standard for direct pupil instruction meant students present with educators in an in-person learning environment. Moving forward, with the continued threat of COVID-19, education in Wisconsin as it relates to "direct pupil instruction" must be re-clarified to include in-person and virtual learning - as well as opportunities to blend or combine delivery models as the health and safety recommendations change due to the spread of COVID -19. This will help provide educational continuity while honoring the safety of our students and communities.

Rationale

Standardized testing requirements should be waived until such time that the health and safety of our students, educators, and communities will not be put at risk by requiring students to come to school to complete standardized tests. Teachers want to focus on the social emotional needs of students and overcoming loss of instruction. They want time to build relationships with students and continue to move their instruction forward based on individual needs, rather than preparing and overburdening stressed-out students with standardized testing.

The State should work with districts to provide free access to the ACT.

Assessment of Reading 11 Readiness	118.016	Requires school districts to annually assess each pupil enrolled in four-year- old kindergarten to second grade for reading readiness, including for phonemic awareness and letter sound knowledge. The results of the assessment must be reported to the parent and remedial services must be provided if indicated.
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Rationale

The Assessment of Reading Readiness is administered to students individually and in person. This assessment requirement, just as the federal standardized testing requirement should be waived until such time that the health and safety of our students, educators, and communities will not be called into question by requiring students to come to school to be properly assessed in person.

	Commencement of School Term	118.045	Prohibits school districts from commencing the school term before September 1, unless the school board submits a request and reasons for the request to DPI, and DPI determines that there are extraordinary reasons for granting it. Athletics, in-service days, work days, and year-round school are not affected.

Rationale

As school districts make plans to re-start formal instruction, they are faced with social distancing requirements, bus ridership recommendations, and the general lack of comfort many families feel about returning students to a traditional brick-and-mortar school environment. In order to accommodate the safety precautions needed to safely teach our students, the traditional agrarian structure of a school calendar needs to be afforded flexibility. The commencement of a school term prior to September 1 and allowing for flexibility in managing traditional with virtual learning as is proposed by several institutions of higher learning within the UW system must be allowed. Laying additional safety requirements into a typical school calendar will not allow for the rigor and depth of instruction Wisconsin is known for nationally.

Rationale

School and School District performance reports are intertwined with Federal standardized testing results. With waivers granted for the 2019-2020 school year and sought for the 2020-2021 school year, allowing schools and districts to self-report is a viable alternative. Schools can report on their academic offerings, opportunities for traditional and virtual instruction, safety precautions in place during the global pandemic and other locally driven indicators of how the school is working with the community to meet the needs of students, families, and local communities served.
